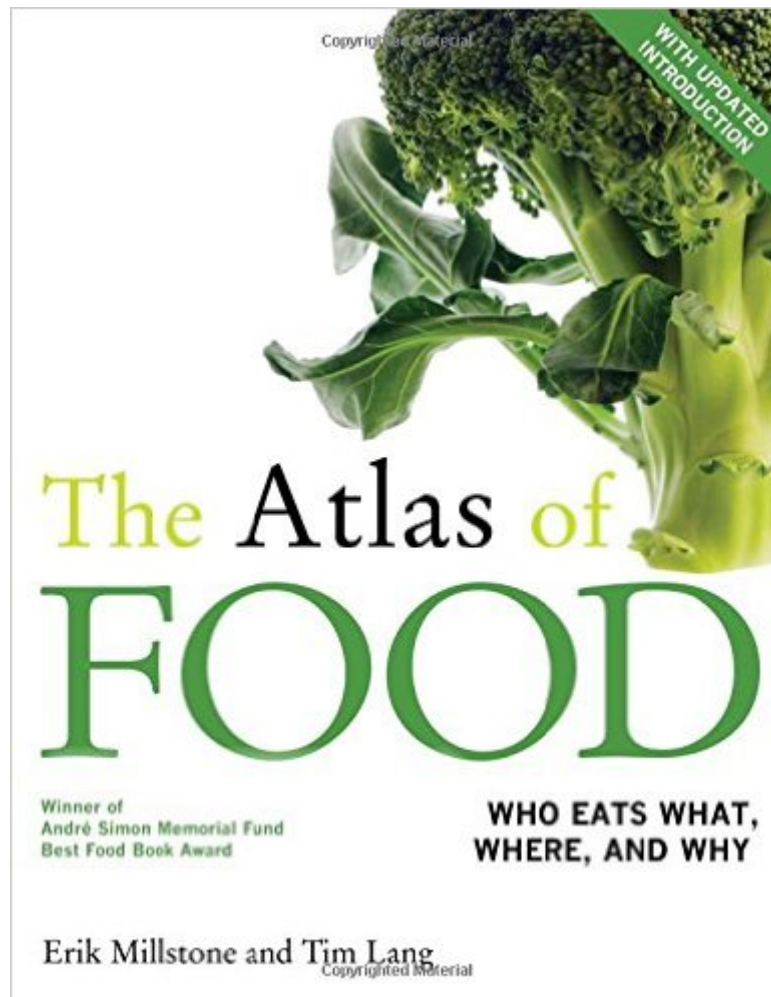


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# The Atlas Of Food: With A New Introduction
